SOCIALISTS' TRIAL GOING SMOOTHLY; OPPOSITION L.A.G.S

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 2.—All opposition to the further trial of the five suspended Socialists was swept away mysteriously between late afternoon and the meeting of the assembly tonight. Assemblyman William C. Amos of New York announced this afternoon that he would debate his resolution calling for the reseating of the Socialists introduced last week, but he failed to take any action.

Assemblyman McLoughlin introduced a resolution based on the proposition that votes and speeches in the assembly are privileged and not admissible as evidence at the trial. He quoted a ruling of the United States Supreme court to that effect.

Adoption of his resolution would eliminate the Socialists' votes of "no" on military appropriations.

Each Willing Others Should Lower Profits

Washington, D. C., Feb. 2.—After secret negotiations today between department of justice officials and representatives of makers and sellers of men's clothing, federal officials said each group was willing that the other groups should curtail profits. It is said committees may be formed to see what can be done by agreement as to lowering prices.

For New College

Ground was broken yesterday by the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Rempe for Rosary college, a Catholic institution for women, to be erected in River Forest at a cost of \$1,000,000. Dr. John W. Melody delivered the chief address. The Rosary hall choir sang. Mrs. Edward Hines and Mrs. William S. Hefferan, chairman and vice chairman, respectively, of the campaign committee for funds, also participated.

The college will be conducted by the Dominican sisters, who, at the invitation of Archbishop George W. Mundelein, are transferring Saint Clara college from Sinsinawa, Wis., to River Forest and changing its name to Rosary college. The archbishop will be chancellor.

The site comprises thirty acres. The buildings will be of Gothic architecture, including administration building, liberal arts hall, gymnasium, science hall, and music auditorium. Ralph Adams Cram is the architect. It will be opened to students in October, 1921. The campaign committee will endeavor to raise \$500,000.

BILL TO ABOLISH SUBTREASURY AT CHICAGO IN HOUSE

Washington, D. C., Feb. 2.—[Special.]—A bill which would abolish the subtreasury in Chicago on June 30, 1921, or such earlier date as might be determined by the secretary of the treasury, was introduced in the house today by Representative Platt, New York, chairman of the committee on banking and currency. The measure also applies to subtreasuries in other cities.

"No doubt the subtreasuries can be dispensed with, and a considerable saving accomplished," Mr. Platt said, "as many of the duties for which they were established have already been taken from them, and the rest can readily be apportioned to the federal banks, the treasury at Washington and the assay offices."

1,000 N. J. Tenants Start Strike Against Paying Rent

Jersey City, N. J., Feb. 2.—More than 700 tenants filed out papers for prosecuting "profiteering landlords" at an indignation meeting here tonight. More than 1,000 declared a "rent strike," signifying their willingness to refuse to pay rent until their landlords "become reasonable."
